Websites

- No one judges the quality or accuracy of information that is found on the web before it is published.
- You need to evaluate the information before you use it.
- Some sites are created by experts, unfortunately most are not.

Accuracy and Authority

- Who is the author and what are their qualifications?
- Is the information credible and reliable?

Purpose and Content

- What is the purpose of the website?
- Is the information subjective (biased or opinionated), objective (Factual) or mixed?

Currency

- How current is the information?
- When was the site last revised, modified or updated?
- Do the links still work?

Design, Organisation and Ease of use

- Is it slow to load, difficult to search or read?
- Does it have distracting ads and flashing side bars?
