What a wonderful term we have had! There have been some very exciting and innovative programs and experiences we have implemented for our students this term. Here are just a few.

Senior Literacy Program

We received funding from the Department of Education and Community (DEC) to employ and additional teacher two days each week to work with Senior Students on literacy. We have seen some promising results already this term, so are excited about continuing this program during Semester 2.

At the end of the year, we will put a report into the ASR and also onto the website about our achievements!

Fast Forward Literacy Program

A small number of Year 8 students participated in this computer-based literacy program every day for 2 periods during Terms 1 and 2. Their improvement in literacy has been phenomenal! Candice Keir, the STLA, worked with them on this program. Parents and students alike have been very excited with the progress.

Curriculum Review

Uniform

We have been stressing that students need to be in full school uniform and Ms Thompson (HT English) and Ms Busby (HT HSIE) have been doing a fine job monitoring this. I would like to thank parents and students both for the wonderful response to our requests, getting into uniform.

I know it can be hard sometimes, but the students look fabulous and their improved appearance has been positively commented on by the community as well as visiting primary school students and staff.

If you need assistance with uniform, please contact reception. If you have second-hand uniform in good condition, then please consider donating it to the school clothing pool.

Students Leaving Early

Students should be at school all day. Students may leave early only for a reason that is approved by the Principal. If your child does need to leave early, then they need to seek permission from the Principal or the Deputy Principal, if I am not available. Do not SMS or call your child on their mobile phone to ask them to meet you out the front of the school or

in reception! If you need to take your child home urgently and unexpectedly, then you must come into reception yourself and request permission to take them home from school.

Student Attendance

Remember – your child needs to be at school every day that the school is open! If they are away, you need to seek approval for this leave from me.

Approved Leave

Leave can be approved only for:

- Illness
- Unavoidable medical appointment
- Urgent and exceptional family circumstance such as a funeral
- Attendance at a recognised religious holiday.

Unapproved Leave

Leave will not be approved for:

- Shopping, hair-cuts and the like
- Sleeping in
- Working at home or minding younger siblings
- Minor family events such as birthdays
- Paid work

FROM THE DEPUTY'S DESK

As we end Semester 1 and look forward to the holidays, I would like to congratulate all our students on their achievements from the first half of the year. Semester reports will provide students and parents with accurate information and data to assess their progress in all subjects. Please contact the school to discuss any concerns or questions regarding this information.

Students should reflect on their achievements and ask themselves one simple question "did I do my best?" If the answer is yes, you should be proud of your efforts and set new goals for semester 2 courses. If the answer was no, then perhaps some time should be spent asking yourself why? The only person you will be letting down is yourself! Learning is the key to opening the doors for your future. Don't shut doors and limit your potential.

The uniform policy has been strengthened this semester and will continue to be supported throughout semester 2. Thank you to all families for their support of this process. Please review the information within this publication or contact the school for further information and clarification of uniform expectations.

The school is currently working in conjunction with the region to improve student attendance. All students attendance is reviewed daily, both whole day absences and partial attendance. Ms Ruis is the Attendance Coordinator and will be monitoring this area very closely semester 2. We would appreciate the support of all parents to ensure that your child's absences are explained through writing. All parents who have provided mobile phone numbers will receive SMS information daily if your child is absent.

We are aware of some students leaving the school grounds during the day. This will result in disciplinary action for those students.

It sends a very poor image to the community and poses a safety risk for those students. Students who have attendance concerns will also be placed on attendance monitoring cards and may meet with the Home School Liaison Officer for further support or structured

attendance plans. It is well documented that attendance at school is directly linked to improved career opportunities.

Finally, we will be fortunate to have new sporting facilities built over the holidays. The existing basketball courts and multi-purpose courts will be re-surfaced. The school has been successful in its application to the Premiers Sport Facilities grant. Students will have access to a combined Netball/Basketball court and a multipurpose play area in the existing fenced courts.

The outside courts will be pressure cleaned and remarked. Exercise and physical activity is always encouraged, however it must be in a safe and structured manner. Many boys currently enjoy touch football at recess and lunch on the Basketball courts.

This is becoming dangerous due to the large number of players and lack of structured rules. Semester 2- all TOUCH football must be played on the supervised grassed playing area. There is absolutely **NO TACKLE OR GRAB FOOTBALL** at school!!! Students who tackle or grab will be excluded from the game or the game cancelled and the ball confiscated for the remainder of the day.

I hope everyone has a safe and relaxing holiday.

She then opened up the floor to questions, and our own Robert Harris asked an intriguing question of Dr Bashir. He was eager to find out

how the Governor felt about Australia becoming a republic. Needless to say, she had a somewhat passionate answer for Robert that sparked a heated conversation around the room. Nevertheless she was happy to listen to everyone's opinion and was happy to leave everyone with something to think about.

By far the highlight of the day was getting to enjoy afternoon tea with Dr Bashir on the balcony of Government house. She was more than happy to answer more questions and was extremely friendly and approachable.

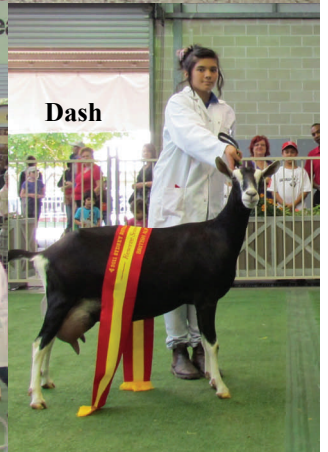

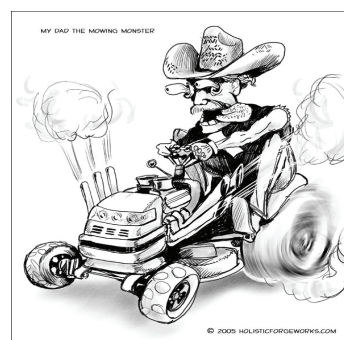

MATHS COUNTS

In this newsletter I will outline suggestions that students can use to improve their performance and achieve higher results. These suggestions are:-

- Bring all equipment to class. Some of the things that you need to bring to class are:
- Exercise book
- Calculator
- Ruler
- Pen, pencil and eraser
- Be ready to start work straight away.
- Really listen to instructions.
- Use class time effectively.
- Think during explanations.
- Ask lots of questions.

This term the Mathematics faculty participated in workshops for visiting Year 5 and 6 students from our partner primary schools. These were successful and all the students were very positive about the school.

It was very disappointing that we had to cancel our Year 8 Gifted and Talented Day at Doonside High School from lack of interest amongst our students.

During this term some of our classes have been participating in a pilot program. The program involves using the *Mangahigh* website mathematics resource. We will be reporting on this website's effectiveness as a learning tool in our classrooms. We have had a very positive response from our students so far and hope to be able to incorporate it into our teaching and learning programs in the future.

NEW TECHNOLOGY TOOLS FOR YOUR CHILD

Over the next few weeks students will see their student portal change with a new look, enhanced features and a new URL. Four new student portals have been developed to support the different needs of students: Kindergarten to Year 2, Years 3-6, Years 7-12 and TAFE.

On 14 June 2011 Year 9 students received their new student portal. Year 9 will be followed by Year 10, Years 7 and 8, then TAFE. Years 11 and 12, Kindergarten to Year 2 and finally Years 3 to 6 will follow early in term 3.

From 14 June 2011 all school students will access their student portal, from home and at school, from a new URL: <http://student.det.nsw.edu.au>, whether or not they have access to the new student portal.

Students will be able to search, access and organise information for school tasks via their student portal on computers used at home or at school, at any time. The new student portal will have timetable and calendar portlets for students to add their own details. Students will also be able make their portal look the way they want by changing the colour scheme and rearranging, opening or closing portlets.

Following are each of the speakers and the advice they had to offer those present on the night.

Justin Verstegen. Yr 12-2010. Currently employed as an apprentice Carpenter.

“ I am now employed as an apprentice carpenter with ALL DAY CONSTRUCTIONS. I was introduced to them by the WISE EMPLOYMENT AGENCY in Windsor.

Now that I have left school and gained employment, I have realised that the subjects that I chose at school were more important than I thought at the time. The subjects that helped me the most were maths, wood work and work studies. Work studies because I did work placement and the skills I gained gave me great skills and experiences to put on a resume.

These subjects were also my favourite subjects. If I was in Yr 10 knowing what I know now, I would probably try and get more work experience and also I would have studied harder.“

Erin Hodgkins. Yr 12 – 2011. Currently completing HSC at WHS. Studying to achieve an ATAR for University admission.

“ In Year 10 I wanted to be a psychologist. I researched that I needed to do 2 Unit maths and advanced English. I then chose subjects that I was interested in, which were: Legal Studies, Society and Culture, Biology and Textiles.

At the beginning of Yr 12, I dropped biology

because it was my lowest ranked subject and I felt having 10 units/5 classes allowed me more time to work on my remaining subjects. My textiles class is done by correspondence through the DISTANCE EDUCATION UNIT, This involves the teacher sending out work to me and I send it back weekly.

Textiles is a practical subject so Mrs Pidgeon has come back to school each Friday to help me with my major work. I am now focusing on studying so I can get my goal ATAR which will allow me to get into the uni course I want. “ When I was in Yr 10, I wanted to be a History teacher and the subjects I needed to choose were: English and either Ancient or Modern History, depending on which I wanted to choose. In Yr 11 I studied Advanced English, 2U maths, legal Studies, Ancient History, Society and Culture, Extension English.

I also studied Business Services through an organisation called JobQuest, while I completed a traineeship to receive Certificate II in Business Services and Administration. Studying through JobQuest meant that I had my work sent to me and communicated through a trainer via email as well as schedule meetings on a regular basis.

During Yr 11 I dropped Society and Culture because it was my lowest ranking subject, so it allowed me to focus on my other subjects.

As part of my traineeship I am required to work each week in my designated work place to develop the skills I am learning. After studying the subjects I have chosen and also being offered the opportunity to attend career days, my career plan has changed and I would now like to attend Uni to study social work in the area of child protection.

Although I am completing a VET course as part of a traineeship, I am still eligible to receive an ATAR which will allow me to attend uni."

Jayden Bray. Yr 12 – 2011. Currently completing HSC, working towards achieving an ATAR at WHS.

" At the beginning of Yr 10, I wanted to be a Personal Trainer. This required subjects of English and PDHPE. I also chose subjects that I was interested in.

Doing all my classes at school was a major advantage because I did not have to travel or rely on other people to send me work. At the end of the HSC I now hope to attend university and study Exercise Science. Which will give me qualifications to start my own business as a personal trainer. "

Keira Bates. Yr 11 - 2011. Currently completing HSC, working towards attainment of relevant prerequisite certificates and qualifications to gain acceptance into Animal Studies at TAFE.

" In Yr 10 I chose Primary Industries during sport as I figured this was a better option for me than sport. Now in Year 11 I'm sitting my HSC exam in Primary Industries this Year as I will finish the course at the end of Yr 11, since I started in as early admission in Yr 10.

The other subjects I chose were English, Maths, Exploring Early Childhood, Ancient History and Visual Arts. I chose these because I like aspects of them. At the end of the HSC, I intend to become a Vet Nurse and I attend to do Animal Studies at TAFE. So, I will leave Yr 12 with a HSC and Certificate II in Animal Studies as I have already completed the requirements to gain entry into my ideal course by getting them whilst at school through TVET. "

Fifteen Year 10 students from our school attended this very informative day to assist with preparing them for entering the World of Work.

The day was jointly organised by the Careers Advisors from the four Hawkesbury High Schools, primarily for Yr 10 Work Education students. Students were rotated around workshops across the day including: Dressing for Success, Work Readiness, Personal Strengths, Community Participation, TAFE.

The goal was for students to develop a clear career plan of the pathways they could take to achieve their work goals.

We were honoured that a past WHS student and now a local business woman-Rhonda Williams, owner of Ron De Vu Beauty Salon, gave up her time to lead the girls workshop for " Dressing for Success " . Not only did she provide invaluable advice for the girls in relations to clothing and resume presentation, but also gave the girls tips on appropriate makeup skills – the girls had fun getting " made up ".

Mrs Calvert also lead an interesting and revealing workshop on identifying personal strengths, which included identifying individual personality traits in an activity called " Which Simpson's Character are you?" It was fun to see what character you were most like based on your identified strengths and weakness.

My work experience at Vogue Hair design: Rebecca Shroeder, Yr 10

For the last four days I have been at work experience at Vouge Hair Design in Windsor. During my time there I experienced and learnt how to: Set hair; Perm hair; Tint hair; Wash my mum's hair; Blow dry; Braid and a upside down braid. Use Hot rollers; Learnt how to section hair; Pin curls; Sweeping hair; Learnt how to mix colours and a lot of other fun things. It was a lot of fun and I really enjoyed learning and meeting new people. I would love to go back and learn more.

I would also like to study more after I finish Year 12 and maybe consider becoming a hair dresser in the future.

Past WHS successful student return to inspire current Yr 12 students.

Ryan Sheridan: Ryan left Year 12 in 2006. He is currently completing his Masters in Education at UWS.

He plans to teach music. Ryan spoke to Yr 12 about his journey through Yr 12 and his decisions on completing his HSC. At the half yearly in Yr 12 point, Ryan did not perform well. So he decided he really wanted to go to uni and that he needed to knuckle down. From the half yearly point, he undertook regular study, resulting him achieving a high enough ATAR to gain entry into his desired uni course. Ryan's acceptance also involved undergoing an interview.

His experience was invaluable in the interviewers seeing that he was a genuine candidate. Ryan also talked about the challenges of uni, in particular the "little fish, big sea" feeling of lecturers offering little to no help and students being left to their own devices to understand and complete assessments. He also spoke of the cost of uni, and that even if you fail, you still have to pay several thousand \$\$.

Ryan was a wonderful speaker, and his words are invaluable advice for all senior students.

Rhonda Williams: Rhonda left Yr 12 at the end 2001.. She now owns and runs her own Beauty Salon: Ron De Vue / Studio 206, in Windsor.

Rhonda has had such an interesting working life journey. Leaving school at the end of Year 10, she began work as an apprentice in a beauty salon. Half way through what would have been Yr 11, her previous Year Advisor contacted her to see how things were going and suggested she think about returning to complete her HSC.

Rhonda was concerned about the missed work, but she was allowed to come back, catch up on missed work and see how she went in the half yearly Yr 11 exams. After a lot of studying and

completing assignments the rest of the students had already handed in, Rhonda passed all exams with flying colours, even coming first in some subjects. On completing her HSC, she applied for and got accepted into uni. However, whilst completing her HSC, Rhonda continued to work in and completed her Industry Certificates for Beauty. As such, she decided to continue to work full time in the industry rather than go to uni. After a few years had received several promotions until she was managing 6 salons that belonged to the one business.

This involved managing not only the salons but the staff in each. After a point, she decided it was time to change, so studied of a night to learn how to run your own business, and 3 years ago opened up her own salon. Along the way, Rhonda also saw a job advertisement to work in a beauty spa at a resort on Daydream Island. She got a very good take home pay, plus accommodation and food thrown in, not to mention the lifestyle of a tropical Island!!

All this..... and it started at Windsor High!!

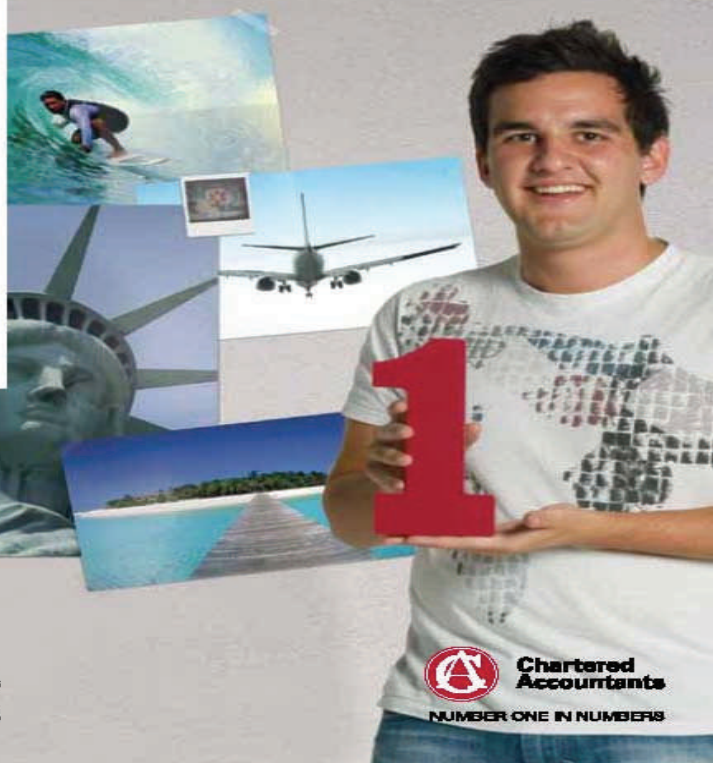

GIFTED AND TALENTED TRANSITION REPORT

SCIENCE WORKSHOPS

Windsor High school has introduced a Gifted and Talented component to the Transition Program. Throughout the year Gifted and Talented students across all partner primary schools have been invited to attend an hour long workshop over four weeks in one of the following key learning areas, Science, Maths and CAPA.

Mr Jones has just completed the first of these Gifted and Talented Workshops and students have enjoyed the opportunity to work in a science lab. Students, in the first lesson, were introduced to the various dangers linked to working in Science. This culminated with each student learning how to safely light a Bunsen burner. Session two was all about measuring the temperature of water as it was heated and the handling of hot, dangerous equipment in a laboratory.

Forensic Science was the theme of the third session where students had the task of identifying which of four beakers contained glucose.

The various solutions were tested with Benedict's Solution which was then heated in a water bath. The final session was given to the study of the Microbial World and the correct use of microscopes. Students were able to locate a range of small "critters" that were living in a hay infusion.

Students had an exciting time gaining skills that would not be normally possible to experience in a traditional primary school classroom.

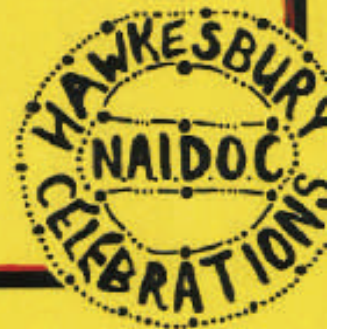

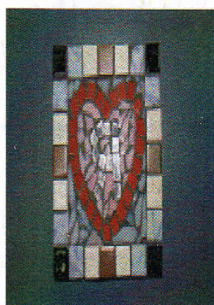
