This could be you!

In late 2011, NSW Fair Trading received a number of calls from students and parents who had been scammed out of large sums of money by businesses offering to organise the ultimate formal or after-party experience. The businesses did not book any venues or entertainment and cancelled the formal or after-party at the last minute, leaving the students with nothing.

To ensure you have a great formal or after-party follow these tips:

- **♦ Conduct your own research on the business.**Do an online search of the business and get references from people who have used them before.
- **Know who you are dealing with.** Get their name, position, business name and company registration.
- ★ Know what you want from the event. Don't be hassled by the business into getting something you don't want.
- Ensure you get everything in writing. The agreement should include all the services that are provided, all costs involved, when and where the event will take place and the refund policy.
- Don't sign anything if you don't understand all the terms and conditions. If you are unsure of anything, ask questions or call Fair Trading.
- ★ Have a parent, teacher or legal professional read any written agreement. Also, have them available when you contact the business.
- ♣ Don't pay anything until you get a written agreement. Pay using electronic funds transfer, cheque or credit card as it is easier to trace who was paid and when.
- **Keep all receipts.** They may come in handy in the future.
- ★ If the deal seems too good to be true, it probably is.

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents



Did you know that if a student misses as little as eight days in a school term, by the end of primary school they will have missed over a year of education?

The compulsory years of schooling

In New South Wales, all children from six years of age are legally required to attend school or be registered for home schooling. After they complete Year 10 and until they turn 17 years of age, students then have the following options. They may also be in:

- full-time further education and training (e.g. TAFE, traineeship, apprenticeship);
- full-time, paid employment of an average of 25 hours per week; or
- a combination of both of the above.

Children are expected to attend all school activities, on time. Regular attendance helps your child:

- develop the skills needed to access the world of work and other opportunities
- to learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- make and keep friendships.

What if my child has to be away from school?

If your child has to be absent from school, you must tell the school and provide a reason for your child's absence. To explain an absence parents and carers may be required to:

- send a note to the school, or contact the school via electronic means such as SMS text message, fax or email, or
- telephone the school, or
- visit the school.

A small number of absences may be accepted by the principal. For example, if your child:

- has to go to a special religious ceremony
- is required to attend a serious or urgent family situation (e.g. a funeral)
- is too sick to go to school or has an infectious illness.

What are school Principals responsible for?

Principals help to ensure the safety, welfare and wellbeing of your child. Principals have to keep accurate records of student attendance and the reasons for any absences. Principals are responsible for accepting or not accepting a parent's explanations for their child's absences. Principals may request further information from parents for long or frequent absences, even where they are explained by parents as being due to illness.

When absences are unexplained by parents, or the explanations are not accepted by the principal, the school will work with parents to help address the issue. The main aim is to sort out what is preventing the child from getting to school and putting strategies in place to help. Sometimes, the school will ask support staff and other agencies to assist.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department may take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unacceptable absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken.

 Attendance meetings and compulsory attendance conferences

Parents (and sometimes their child) can be asked to go to a meeting with school personnel and other regional officers. The aim of the meeting is to help identify strategies to support the child and family. Other agencies may also be invited along to help, if parents agree.

If the school and other regional officers have tried to help improve a child's attendance, without success, parents (and sometimes their child) can be asked to go to a compulsory attendance conference. The conference will be run by a trained conference convenor. The aim of the conference is for the school, parents (and sometimes their child) and other identified agencies ("the parties") to further identify the issues which are impacting on a child's attendance.

The outcome of a compulsory attendance conference is for the parties to agree to undertake certain actions to improve the child's attendance. These actions are written in the form of undertakings.

 Applications to the Children's Court – A Compulsory Schooling Order

Legal compliance can be sought through an application to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The aim is to assist a family and/or child to address the issues which are preventing satisfactory school attendance but has the added enforcement of a Court's powers.

■ Prosecution in the Local Court

If all attempts by schools and regional support staff fail to improve a student's attendance, action can be taken in the Local Court and the result can be fines up to a maximum of \$11,000.

MATHS COUNTS

I am sure that all students are feeling more relaxed now that the Half-Yearly Examinations are over. At this time reports are in the process of being sent out. This is a good time for reflection and many students and parents may be asking themselves how they can improve in mathematics. Outlined below are some suggestions:

Bring all equipment to class. If you are a sportsperson, you know that turning up to a soccer match, for example, without things like soccer boots and a soccer ball will severely limit your chances of playing a good game. It is the same for mathematics. You need specialised equipment to make your time in class more effective.

Some of the things that you need to bring to class are:

- Exercise book
- Calculator
- Ruler
- Pen, pencil and eraser

Be ready to start work straight away.

Many students come into class and just sit there chatting instead of taking out their books. The problem with this is that by the time you locate everything you need, your teacher is probably half-way through the first explanation and you are already beginning to be left behind.

It is always harder playing catch-up!

As soon as you enter the classroom, take your books and equipment out and open up your exercise book and be ready to learn.

Really Listen to Instructions.

Have you ever thought you were sitting there listening but then at the end of the instructions discovered that you had absolutely no idea what you were supposed to be doing in the lesson? It is easy for this to happen. Training your mind to listen is a skill that you <u>can</u> learn and develop. It simply requires a bit of effort in the beginning until it becomes a habit to listen rather than just hear. Then it will just happen

automatically.

And Study, Study and more Study.

When student papers are returned, as part of our feedback, the students complete a survey indicating how much study they have done prior to the examination. Although I admire their honesty, it is disappointing to see how little time they put into studying. Students should revise notes and examples after every lesson as well as completing their homework. Before examinations they should start revising all their notes and redo exercises at least two weeks prior to their examination.

During the term the mathematics faculty conducted some workshops for visiting Year 5 and 6 students from our local schools. These workshops were very successful and all students were very positive about the school.

It is still not too late to register for the Mathematics Competition held 2nd August, 2012. This is a very prestigious competition and I encourage all talented mathematicians to enter. Cost is \$5. 50. If your child has lost their note, they can go to their teacher and ask for a new one.

Don't forget to try our puzzle below. Both parents and students are welcome to submit an answer to the mathematics staff. There are certificates for correct answers and a surprise for the grand winner at the end of the year.

PUZZLE CORNER

Imagine you are in a room 10 m x 10 m x 10 m. Nothing, not even gas, can get into or out of the room. After every breath you take, your exhalation adds 200 mL of carbon dioxide to the room. Theoretically, if there is no carbon dioxide in the room to begin with, how many breaths will it take to raise the carbon dioxide concentration in the room to 500ppm by volume?

Work Safety Memo

Restrictions on climbing structures by staff and students and working at height

Working at Height

Staff and students are reminded that Workplace safety regulations state that school staff must not work at heights above 2 metres. This includes all teaching and other staff, including the General Assistant.

Specially trained and equipped workers are hired to clean gutterings and rooves, cut trees, change lights (including in the hall) and so on.

Student supervision and Safety

In addition, students **MUST NOT** climb up on structures, trees, buildings for any purpose.

This includes:

- · climbing fences,
- gates
- Brick walls
- Onto ledges near windows
- On rooves
- In trees.

Staff must NOT ask students to climb up and retrieve any objects from any such structures.

Using the risk Assessment matrix, this is estimated to be a risk level of 2. (*Likelihood*: unlikely, could happen but rarely; *Severity*: could kill or cause permanent disability or ill health.)

If a child throws something up onto a ledge, a teacher is not to ask any child to retrieve it nor should they retrieve it themselves.

The teacher can refer the matter to the Deputy Principal or to the General Assistant who can advise them as to whether the object can be safely retrieved.

Sometimes, the object can only be retrieved when specialised workers are employed to work at heights.

Students must be reminded of this restriction regularly via newsletters, assemblies and during relevant outdoor activities.

Teachers must ensure that they report urgently to the OHS committee any incidents of students climbing to height.

Student Camps

Sometimes, students attend outdoor recreation camps and

participate in activities such as climbing walls or high ropes.

Students are only allowed to participate in these activities with their parent/caregiver's informed consent, when a risk assessment has been completed and the risk has been shown to be managed and when the person in charge of the activity has the necessary training, qualifications and equipment.


