PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Welcome to Term 2! This is always a very busy term for all students and teachers! There are many activities scheduled in this term, all of which are really important to improving the school.

This term are students' half-yearly exams and also semester one reports so we can let you know how your child is progressing with their learning. If you are at all concerned about your child's progress with their learning or if you just want to have a chat, please take the time to give us a call.

Lesson Study

This term we have begun Lesson Study across the facilities of English, PDHPE and CAPA. This is an important initiative for our teachers to assist them share, reflect and improve their teaching practice. More faculties will participate in Lesson Study in Term 3.

. WALKING TOGETHER . LEARNING TOGETHER .

In Lesson Study, teachers work in pairs to plan a lesson strategy, observe each other's teaching, reflect on the lesson and refine what they are doing. Evidence shows that these sorts of professional learning experiences drive improvement in classroom practice and help children learn better. Teachers are focussing on literacy strategies which will help students of all age groups improve in reading and writing.

Year 12 Academic Review

We are currently conducting academic reviews of all Year 12 students. These reviews are conducted by the Year Adviser (Ms Walker), Head Teacher of Year 12 (Ms Thompson), DP Mr Mudiman and the Principal. As part of the review, the Careers Adviser Ms Calvert organises the exits plans for all year 12 students. Exit plans focus on the wishes and need of students post-HSC. Most of our students plan to attend university or to enter TAFE courses.

During the review, the student presents all examples of their work including class notes, assessments, and discusses aspects of their learning. We link students up with trained tutors who assist them complete aspects of their assessments or develop understanding of areas of work that they find difficult.

Windsor High is very proud of its extensive tutor program and I encourage all senior students to take full advantage of this free service.

Senior School Review

Windsor High School, in collaboration with the University of Western Sydney, is conducting a review of its practices in the senior school. The review will include aspects of how well we prepare students in the junior school for their studies in senior years.

We will start this review towards the end of this term and conclude it in term 3. The review is to examine how the school caters for the academic and learning needs of the students in seniors years. As part of the review parents, teacher and students will be surveyed to ask about their opinions and

attitudes to many aspects of school life including:

What it takes to achieve well in their HSC
Do students want an ATAR to go to university

Do we provide the courses that students want for their year 12 courses

How can we improve what we do.

The Senior School review will ask parents as well if they want to participate in the review as well; if you want to complete the survey then you will be able to find it on the website or ask for a hard copy and we will send it home with your child.

The school will also collect and exam data about our students' past levels of achievement, attendance, curriculum patterns as well as attitudes to schooling and to post schooling goals.

If you want any further information or if you would like to be involved in some way, please contact the Principal.

Collection of updated family data.

Our school has been fortunate to get additional funding this year which we use to employ additional teaching staff and additional executive teachers, such as a second DP. We also employ extra SLSOs (teachers' aides) and trained tutors to work with our students.

This money is given to us based upon the information the Department of Education holds about the families of our students. This is the information that is on the student's enrolment forms. For some of our families some of this information is missing and it could affect our funding for 2015.

It is urgent that we collect complete information about all families of our students over the next few weeks so either Ms Christine Murphy the Senior Administration Manager or the Principal will contact those families affected for a chat. The information is kept confidential.

Mobile Phone Policy

Windsor High School's mobile phone policy is '**Off and Out of Sight**'.

Appropriate Language at School

Students have recently been reminded that inappropriate language (swearing) will not be tolerated at Windsor High. This includes swearing at teachers and other students. I should say that in general it is only a very small percentage of our students that forget to use their manners. Therefore, in line with the Department of Education's 'Suspension and Expulsion of School Students Procedures' this will be treated as **hostile behaviour** toward staff or students and as such may result in a suspension from school for aggressive behaviour. Students are often reminded by me and the rest of the staff to follow our core values of Safety, Achievement, Teamwork and Respect, thus ensuring a positive and productive school day for all.

Examinations

Last week our Year 7 and 9 students participated in the annual NAPLAN examinations. It was great to see the students working so diligently on what will certainly provide additional information to teachers to



support our students. Can't wait to see the results. Half Yearly Examinations for Year 11 will commence in Week 5, Monday 26th May and Years 9 and 10 the following week starting 2nd June. Students need to ensure that they are adequately prepared for their exams by revising work covered in class throughout the semester. I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of our students the best of luck in their upcoming exams.

	<p>Fairytale for Wilde Girls by Allyse Near</p> <p>A deliciously dark bubblegum-gothic fairytale from a stunning new Australian talent. 'He's gone the same way as those little birds that bothered me with their awful songs! And you will too, you and your horrible heart-music, because you won't stay out of my woods!' There's a dead girl in a birdcage in the woods. That's not unusual. Isola Wilde sees a lot of things other people don't. But when the girl appears at Isola's window, her every word a threat, Isola needs help. Her real-life friends - Grape, James and new boy Edgar - make her forget for a while. And her brother-prince - magical creatures seemingly lifted from the pages of the French fairytales Isola idolises - will protect her with all the fierce love they possess. It may not be enough. Isola needs to uncover the truth behind the dead girl's demise... before the ghost steals Isola's last breath.</p>
	<p>Life in Outer Space by Melissa Kell</p> <p>Sam Kinnison is a geek, and he's totally fine with that. He has his horror movies, his nerdy friends, World of Warcraft - and until Princess Lela turns up in his bedroom, worry about girls he won't. Then Camilla Carter arrives on the scene. She's beautiful, friendly and completely irrelevant to his plan. Sam is determined to ignore her, except that Camilla has a plan of her own - and he seems to be a part of it! Sam believes that everything he needs to know he can learn from the movies. But perhaps he's been watching the wrong ones. Life in Outer Space is Melissa Kell's brilliantly sweet and funny YA debut.</p>
	<p>The First Third by Will Kostakis</p> <p>Life is made up of three parts: in The First Third, you're embarrassed by your family; in the second, you make a family of your own; and in the end, you just embarrass the family you've made. That's how Billy's grandmother explains it, anyway. She's given him her bucket list (cue embarrassment), and now, it's his job to glue their family back together. No pressure or anything. Filing his family's not going to be easy and Billy's not ready for change. But as he soon discovers, the first third has to end some time. And then what? It's a Greek tragedy waiting to happen.</p>
	<p>The Incredible Here and Now by Felicity Castagna</p> <p>Michael's older brother dies at the beginning of the summer he turns 15, but as its title suggests The Incredible Here and Now is a tale of wonder, not of tragedy. Presented as a series of vignettes, in the tradition of Sandra Cisneros Young Adult classic The House on Mango Street, it tells of Michael's coming of age in a year which brings him grief and romance; and of the place he lives in Western Sydney where those who don't know any better drive through the neighbourhood and lock their car doors, and those who do, fouth in its mix of cultures. Through his perceptions, the reader becomes familiar with Michael's community and its surroundings, the unsettled life of his family, the girl he meets at the local pool, the friends that gather in the McDonalds parking lot at night, the white Pontiac Trans Am that lights up his life like a magical talisman.</p>
	<p>The Sky So Heavy by Claire Zorn</p> <p>For Rin, it's just like any other day - racing for the school bus, bluffing his way through class and trying to remain cool in front of the most sophisticated girl in his universe. Only it's not like any other day because, on the other side of the world, nuclear missiles are being detonated. When Rin wakes up the next morning, it's dark, bitterly cold and snow is falling. There's no internet, no phone, no TV, no power and no parents. Nothing Rin's learnt in school could have prepared him for this. With his parents missing and dwindling food and water supplies, Rin and his younger brother, Max, must find a way to survive in a nuclear winter... all on their own. When things are at their most desperate, where can you go for help?</p>
	<p>Wildlife by Fiona Wood</p> <p>Life? It's simple: be true to yourself. The tricky part is finding out exactly who you are... Exam Anxiety

Many students work well under stress, with the pressure of the timeline helping them to focus on the task at hand. However, some students struggle when feelings of stress become too overwhelming.

Fears about failing, letting someone down and missing out on opportunities can weigh heavily on teenagers minds.

Common signs of exam anxiety:

- Irritable and emotional (anger, tears, etc).
- Problems sleeping.
- Spends more time alone than with friends.
- Physical symptoms include sweating, nausea, butterflies, racing heart, fidgeting, etc.
- Negative thoughts impacting on their self esteem.
- Struggling to keep on top of everything leading to difficulty concentrating and memory problems.



What can you do?

FAMILY

- Be tolerant and understanding of the anxiety they are experiencing.
- Be a support, not an added pressure.
- Provide healthy meals and monitor their caffeine consumption.
- Encourage good sleep habits.
- Acknowledge that study may have to take priority over family commitments.

FRIENDS

- Keep in touch! Having a break with friends is an important part of managing anxiety.
- Remember that friends are also studying and form a study group.

PLAN

- Work out a study plan and stick to it.
- Break larger tasks into smaller tasks.
- Put breaks for exercising and socialising into the plan.
- Exams and the pressure that comes with it are part of life for teens. Learning how to cope with it is something they all need to experience. They are responsible for their decisions and will have to accept the consequences.
- Remember – plan, don't cram.

THE BIG PICTURE

- Know your options after exams regardless of the results, there is always another path.
- Avoid people who put unnecessary pressure on you and don't do it to yourself.
- Contact your school supports if you need help – teacher, year advisor, school counsellor, etc.

DAY TO DAY

- Eat well and get plenty of sleep.
- Limit screen time as it is too easy to waste hours on computer games / facebook / etc.
- Take time to relax (a bath, yoga, bike ride, surf, etc), whatever works to calm your mind.
- Take it one day at a time, one unproductive study session doesn't mean they will all be like that.

ON THE DAY

- Eat breakfast, a hungry stomach is very distracting.
- Arrive early and with all equipment needed.
- Wait with friends who are calming to be around.
- Use deep breathing at the start and during the exam to keep relaxed.
- Leave time to proofread through your work.

DISABILITY SURVEY

Our school is participating in the collection of nationally consistent data on school students with disabilities. We will be collecting information already available in the school about the support that is being provided to students with disabilities. For the purpose of the survey the definition of disability is defined as a student who has had some adjustments to the regular course of learning. Better data will help the Government plan for students with all types of support needs and to improve student outcomes. The data collection will have no direct impact on your child and they will not be involved in any testing process.

The NSW Department of Education and Communities will provide data to the Australian Government from all NSW public schools in such a way that no individual student or school will be able to be identified. In this way, we will ensure the privacy and confidentiality of all students. All information is protected by privacy laws which regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.
