Run by the dedicated Visual Arts and Music Teachers, the creative arts interest group is an extracurricular activity allowing students the chance to extend their creative and performance side, work as a collective, either in the art classroom to work on their art-making or learning an instrument and playing in a band.

# Wrapping up the year in HSIE!!

HSIE has wrapped up 2016 in style during Term 4! In additional to our exciting activities throughout the year such as "Viking Survivor Day" and our European Medieval Re-enactment Day, this term our Year 8 students have been studying "Japan & the Shogun Era". Students have been immersed in the world of



the Samurai and produced some a m a z i n g "Samurai Warrior Trainin g Manuals" as

their assessment task for this Term. Classes also undertook a study of the History of 'Sumo Wrestling' which is still Japan's most famous national sport today. Students were intrigued by the complex set of rules, regulations and rituals attached to this sport, and investigated some of the most famous Sumo athletes in Japan. Classes also researched the strict

diet regimes of these athletes. and were surprised at how healthy that the foods they consumed actually were. 8S wrapped



up their Japan Unit with two other exciting activities relating to Japanese culture and philosophies. Whilst studying the different religions of Japan, including Shinto and Buddhism, the class learnt about 'meditation', and we even conducted a meditation session in class. Whilst some students found it quite chal-

lenging to remain so still and focused, others commented at the end of the session that they felt very relaxed and calm! Finally, we looked at the philosophy



of "Feng Shui" which is a key part of most Japanese households. We investigated the origins and development of Feng Shui, and then after familiarising ourselves with the key rules of this philosophy, we then analysed one classroom and wrote a "Feng Shui Report" of this room. Students were so engaged by this activity that they decided to undertake "Feng Shui" assessment of a whole range of areas in our school, including the entryway, the Principal's and Deputy's Office, and finally the Library. Students examined

each area and typed up reports giving recommendations for the layout of each room to improve the flow of energy.



Year 7 were also getting creative in Geography this term. 7A finished off their Climate Change Unit, where



they had been investigating solutions to climate change, by designing their own 'alternative-fuel vehicles'!

via the school's Facebook page to see some exiting activities that Year 11 Society & Culture students will undertake. As part of their first HSC Topic we are doing a Focus Study on "India", examining their traditions and cultures. Students will be competing in a "Wrap a Sari" challenge, followed by a creative 'Henna Activity,' and then they finish the year off with a Indian feast!

- 8 Winners will be notified by Friday 3 February 2017


