Year 10 Food Technology completed their assessment task on creating a chocolate bar, including the packaging. They did a brilliant job. Well done!!




































Our Year 12 Hospitality students celebrated finishing their course with 'Naked Cakes'. Congratulations to all students in completing their education, we are very proud of you.

## Gear 7






## Gear 10




## Final Reminder for Year 12

## WRITE A BOOK IN A DAY

On the 12<sup>th</sup> of September, 31 students from Years 7-9, participated in the 'Write a Book in a Day' competition to raise money for the Kids Cancer Project. Students worked from 8:30am until 6pm to create their completed, illustrated books. Students were lucky to have authors, Peter Rix and Christopher Holcroft, donate their time on the day to assist alongside their teachers, Ms Fisher and Ms Burgess. Sandy Fussell, the author of Samurai Kids, also met with students via Zoom to talk to them about story writing and the creative process. Students worked incredibly well on the day and represented Windsor High School to an exceptional standard. So far, students have raised \$2,565 for the Kids Cancer Project, which is an amazing achievement!











# School or Child/Youth Opal Card tap on and tap off campaign support

In Term 4, across the western Sydney bus region we'll be running a campaign to increase the correct use of Opal Cards on the bus network. When Opal Cards are not used, the trip is not recorded, giving us no indication of how many students are boarding the buses and running the risk of services being reduced due to underutilisation.

During Term 4, we're focusing on a simple message - tap on and tap off your Opal card, every time you travel by bus.

## Your local flood risk

The Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley has a long history of flooding.

When there is heavy rainfall, water flows down five major rivers into the floodplain. It is slowed from reaching the ocean by around 80 kilometres of narrow gorges from Ebenezer to Spencer. This means that floodwater can back up and rise quickly, causing wide, deep and dangerous floods.

There are hidden dangers in floodwater like debris. electrical wires, pollutants and sewage. In a flood, bridges can be cut, roads closed, public transport routes interrupted, power lost and mobile phone and internet connections disrupted.

It is important for everyone who lives in the floodplain to be prepared. For more information see www.myfloodrisk.nsw.gov.au

## How to prepare before a flood

- Know where to get updates and warnings
  - Bureau of Meteorology for local weather updates
  - NSW State Emergency Service (NSW SES) for information on floods and storms
  - · ABC Radio as the official emergency broadcaster
- Prepare a 'Get Ready to Go' Kit

#### What to pack:

- 1. Health care items like medications and prescriptions
- Copies of your important documents (hard copies or stored digitally)
- 3. Important valuables and momentos
- 4. Important phone numbers
- 5. Radio, torch, phone chargers and batteries
- 6. Clothing and personal items

## Make a plan for evacuation

Know where you will go, how you will get there, what evacuation routes you can use, what you will do with your animals, and how you will manage your health



#### ✓ Share your plan

Talk with your relatives, friends, and neighbours about what you will do if you need to evacuate

## What to do during a flood



#### Follow NSW SES Flood Advice and **Emergency Warnings**

- Listen to your local ABC radio station for up to date flood information and advice
- Follow advice from NSW SES. If you are asked to evacuate, don't wait until it is too late



#### Take your 'Get Ready to Go' Kit

This should include your medications, prescriptions and any assistance equipment



#### Take your animals

- Put them on leashes or in carriers
- Take food, medication and registration/vaccination documents



#### Know where to go

- Follow advice on evacuations and check live traffic information
- Make your way to relatives or friends outside the floodplain if you can
- Official evacuation centres will be announced at the time of the emergency



#### Look out for each other

Share information with family, friends, and neighbours. Help each other especially people who may need assistance

Your Get How to PREPARE A KIT FOR EVACUATIONS
Ready to Go Kit

Due to the depth and danger of floods in the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley, when an Evacuation Order is issued you may only have a few hours to leave.

## Why you need a kit

- A significant flood in the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley will cause damage to people's homes. It will also cause major disruptions to essential services such as water, electricity, gas, roads and rail lines.
- By the time you know a flood might impact your property, there may be very little time before you have to leave. A key step to getting ready for floods (or for any other natural hazard) is to prepare a Get Ready to Go kit.
- The kit should contain what you will need during and immediately after evacuation, whether you are going to family and friends, or to an evacuation centre.

## What to do now



Either scan, photograph or upload to the cloud, key records and documents (insurance, ID, passports etc)



Put key contact information into your mobile phone (eg doctor, electricity and water utilities etc)



Photograph or scan medication scripts



Check your home and contents insurance policy cover

## What you can place in your kit earlier



Portable radio with spare batteries



Torch with spare batteries



First aid kit (with supplies necessary for your household)



Candles and waterproof matches



Personal hygiene supplies



Waterproof bag for valuables such as important documents (eg passports or insurance) and valuables (photos, jewellery etc)

# What to add to your Get Ready to Go kit when you are leaving



A few toys or family games



A good supply of required medications



Any special requirements and supplies for babies, the disabled, infirm and/or elderly



Fresh food and drinking water




Appropriate clothing and footwear for multiple changes for all household members



Mobile phone and charger

## Maintaining and storing your kit

3-7 days of food and water

Your kit should be kept in a waterproof storage container and stored in a safe place that is easy to access.

for each animal

On a regular basis, check your Get Ready to Go kit (remember to check use-by dates on batteries and medications) and restock items if you need to.

first aid items

Take a photo of your pet's vaccination certificate

Also, keep a list of emergency numbers near your phone or on your fridge.

Know how to

Set Out Flood EVACUATION ROUTES IN THE HAWKESBURY-NEPEAN VALLEY

Floods in the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley can happen with little warning. You may only have a few hours to get out following an evacuation order. You need to be prepared and get to know your evacuation routes.

## Knowing when and how to leave

The Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley has a long history of damaging and dangerous floods. You need to follow evacuation orders to keep you, your family and pets safe. You will typically be asked to leave well before you see any sign of floodwater in your neighbourhood. It is not safe to stay and shelter in your home once you have been ordered to evacuate.

To find out about evacuation orders and which routes are open listen to your local and ABC radio, visit the NSW SES website, or follow NSW SES Facebook, or NSW Police Facebook and Twitter.

## Get familiar with the routes

There are 12 designated evacuation routes that provide the quickest and safest way to exit the Wallacia, Penrith-Emu Plains, Richmond-Windsor, South and Eastern Creek floodplains. (See map on reverse of fact sheet).


You need to be aware of more than one route because each flood behaves differently and evacuation routes will get cut by floodwater at different points. Some routes can get cut quite early in relatively small floods. For example, Windsor Road is cut when floodwaters reach 13.5m at Windsor, around a 1 in 20 chance of happening in any given year.

Even high set evacuation routes can be affected by large floods. The Jim Anderson Bridge would be cut when floodwaters approach its road level at 17.3 metres at Windsor, around a 1 in 100 chance of happening in any given year.

Once you know your best routes, have a conversation with friends or relatives to organise a place to go to. Remember, as each flood can be different, it's important to follow evacuation orders when they are given.


## Follow the signs

More than 150 new flood evacuation signs have been installed across the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley to guide drivers. There are several different types of signs, including a number of folded signs designed to be opened during a flood emergency to provide extra direction for drivers.
