Parents and Carers are encouraged to read the New Student's Code of Behaviour (included in this newsletter) that has been released by the Department of Education and discuss it with their children. This revised document emphasises the need for students to act respectfully and be committed to their learning. SCIENCE NEWS

Year 7 are just concluding their Separating Mixtures topic and are starting to work on a unit on Energy. In this unit, students are learning about potential and kinetic energy, as well as energy conversions. Some examples that students will be investigating include solar to heat and light, electrical to heat, light, sound, and movement.

Year 8 Science classes, as well as completing their Yearly Examination, have also completed their VALID 8 examination. This is a statewide examination that examines students on all Stage 4 Science content. Results will be available to parents in 2024.

Year 8 classes are currently learning about Space, where they will learn about eclipses, tides, and the motion of the Earth causing seasons and day and night.

Year 9 is undertaking a unit of work on Motion involving learning about speed, velocity, and acceleration of objects and Newton's laws of motion. Students are progressing through this topic well and are working on their scientific skills.

Year 10 classes are working well on their topic of Electricity. In this unit of work, students are learning about series and parallel circuits and where they are used, circuit diagrams, and the production of electricity.

Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science

Year 11 students have started their Higher School Certificate course on their first module – Earth's Processes. Students are learning about the changing environment of Earth, including the biosphere and atmosphere, and how organisms emerged on Earth.


Students have been investigating iron band formations in rocks. Shown below are students undertaking their practical investigation to demonstrate this concept.






Year 11 Biology

Students have started their Higher School Certificate course this term with their first topic of Heredity, whereby students are investigating reproduction and inheritance patterns in both plants and animals as well as the role of DNA and the use of technologies in the study of cellular processes and patterns. Students utilised the library group study space to create stopmotions of the process of Polypeptide Synthesis. A very complex process looking at the process of how DNA codes to produce useful materials in the body, such as proteins. See some of their stopmotion images below.






Students will be starting their first depth study of the Year 12 course looking at how the environment can affect phenotypic (physical) expression in plants this week with their first assessment task to follow.

Year 10 Marine Studies

Students in Year 10 are well underway through their topic of Growing Crustaceans and have tried their hand at creating DIY Brine Shrimp Hatcheries (also known as Sea Monkeys). See their efforts below!

Students have also continued to help maintain the aquaponics setup in the Ag Farm with the Silver Perch putting on some serious weight in the warmer months, as well as the fruit and veggies in the grow beds (such as strawberries and cucumbers) growing well.

Behaviour code for students

Information for students and parents or carers

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive, and responsive featning environments for everyone across a range of settings. We teach and model the inclusive and safe behaviours we value in our students.

In NSW public schoots students are expected, to the best of their ability, to:

- show respect to other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- strive for the highest standards in learning
- act in a courteous and respectful way that makes all members of the school community feel valued, included and supported
- resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- most the school's agreed uniform policy or dress code
- attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- respect all property
- be safe and not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, a cohol, vapes, e-digarettes or tobacco into our schools
- not bully, harass, injimidate, or discriminate against anyone in our schools.

Schools take action in response to behaviour that is detrimenful to self or others or to the achievement of high-quality teaching and learning

All students have a right to:

- safety at school
- access and fully participate in their learning.
- be treated with respect by other students, teachers and school staff
- express their views, set goals and selfadvocate

The principal and school staff, using their professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments and apply an appropriate action when slucents are not meeting these expectations. The department is responsible for the provision of a policy framework and resources such as legal issues bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment. In this context, the NSW

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Government and the Department of Education will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.

Behaviour code for students: Student actions

Promoting the inclusion, learning, wollbeing, and safety of all students in NSVV public schools is a high priority for the Department of Education.

We implement teaching and learning approaches across a range of settings to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

Safety


- Model and follow school and class rules and expectations around behaviour and conduct


